Beware of Grammar Homophones

Does that heading have you scratching your head? What is a homophone?

Homophones are those sneaky words that sound similar (or have the same pronunciation) but have different meanings. Below are examples of common homophones. Are they sneaking into your business communication?

Accept to receive or believe a point as valid – Accept the explanation

EXCEPT Not including – exclude – I chose all of the items except this one

AIR The earth's atmosphere or to express an opinion – Air your view

HEIR Person who inherits property or rank – *Heir to the throne*

Capital City that is seat of government or money/assets – Invest capital

CAPITOL The building where legislators meet – State capital in the capital city

CITE Quote a passage or reference – Cite your resource for the information

SITE Area/location or website – The construction site is north of here

FAIR Equitable/unbiased – A fair decision

FARE The charge/fee for a service – The fare for airline tickets is escalating

INCITE Stir up trouble – *Incite a riot*

Insight Deep understanding/awareness – The book shared the author's insight

ITS Belonging to – The brokerage firm lost its license

It's Contraction for two words such as it is/it has – It's a beautiful day

LEAD In charge of (rhymes with need) – Mary will lead the way

LED Past tense of lead – Mary led the way

TIP: Lead that rhymes with bed is the metallic element



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Homophones

(Continued)

MAYBE Possibly/perhaps – Maybe I'll attend

MAY BE Could/would be a possibility – I may be included in the invitation

PEAK Highest tip of a mountain or greatest/maximum – *Peak performance*

PEEK Look quickly – A sneak peek

PIQUE Stimulate interest or curiosity – pique your interest

PRINCIPAL Invested money that earns interest or main/foremost – Principal reason

PRINCIPLE Fundamental belief/truth – He acted on principle instead of personal gain

ROLE An assigned character or a position/responsibility – The CEO's role

ROLL Move by turning over – The roll of the dice

TAIL An animal's rear body part or the end of a line – The tail end of the traffic

TALE A narrative story – Tell me the tale of the tortoise and the hare

THEIR Belonging to/associated with people – *Their belongings*

THERE Designates a place/location – The temperature was hot over there

THEY'RE Contraction of two words, they are—They're lucky to have you on the team

YOUR Belonging to/associated with a person – Your belongings
YOU'RE Contraction of two words, you are – You're welcome



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
